5. **Every child a writer:** Improve standards of writing throughout the school
6. **Narrowing the gap:** Support disadvantaged children to attain as highly as other children
7. **Improving attendance:** Improve attendance by engaging children and instilling a love of learning

Y5 Horstead



On Wednesday 30th September, some of year five went to Horstead in Norwich. It was our residential trip for three days.

When we arrived and got our cases and we then went into our rooms. After we had settled in we had our delicious lunch. Luckily, we then got a bit of free time before our first activity. Then we got lined up in our groups: Wotsits, French Fries, McCoys, Skips and Hula Hoops.

Firstly, Wotsits (Miss Machin's group) went on the Jacob's ladder, which is a colossal ladder. At the bottom it wobbled a lot, but as you got higher it became sturdier. It was made from logs that you had to climb and as you got higher they got wider apart, although you had a partner with you to help you get up.

Next we had archery, with a very hilarious instructor to teach us. There were four groups of three people at a time to shoot. Each person had three arrows on each go. At the end Amber won the game, closely followed by myself.

After we had finished the activity, we then did team races like the sack race and a foot version of a catapult. Following that we then had a scrumptious meal and I had burger, hotdog, chicken and lots of different salad. Then we watched a movie, whilst others showered. Once we had done our morning routine and eaten breakfast, we started our final activity - camp cookery. Foundation Stage Family Cafe



Children in the foundation stage have been having fun learning to retell "The 3 little Pigs" story. They have looked at story maps and then put actions to the story to try to help them remember it.
